Virginia and North Carolina. The operation ran from 9 AM to 5 PM on both days, using W4CA as the call for 11 of the stations and W4NC on the other two. Frequencies were spread out from 7.225 MHz and 7.290 MHz. 20m was also listed, but we did not use it.

And a soggy time was had by all! The FARC manned the Cumberland Knob point on the Parkway, supposedly giving out the Cumberland Knob, 217.5 mile marker position. We actually worked from Doughton Park campground at mile post 241, but what's a couple of miles to the air waves. Four FARC members participated this year, and all had a great time.

Saturday morning started early, with Bob KJ4IC, Henry W2DZO and Raja KB6MTH leaving Winston-Salem at 6:30 AM. Henry pulled the club's new emergency response trailer to use as our antenna tower. Upon arriving at Doughton Park in the pouring rain, we picked a site to use

FARC has a general membership meeting with a program on the 2nd Monday of every month at the Red Cross building, 690 Coliseum Drive in Winston-Salem. The club conducts its main business meeting (sometimes called the Board Meeting) on the 3rd Monday generally at the same location. This is where most of the club's business is conducted and all attending members have a vote. All club members are strongly encouraged to attend the business meeting. (we really had no problem finding a site, as out of about 100 campsites, there seemed to be only 1 other camper). We quickly set up the trailer/tower. I say quickly, but it took a few minutes to figure out how the tower worked. But, there are now 4 more FARC members who know how to use the trailer and tower. Keep in mind; it is still pouring rain, so we set up a makeshift canopy strung between KJ4IC's HHR and the trailer. The club's IC-706MKIIG rig was set up on a card table under the shelter and connected to the club's new emergency automotive battery, purchased by W2DZO the day before.

Saturday's operating went very well. John N0KTY showed up later in the day, and between the four of us we made about 98 contacts for the Bonanza. In checking on 20 meter propagation, we did work a couple of Belgian ON stations and a JW5, Svalbard station, all on 40 watts to our "rotatable dipole". The antenna was actually the 40m driven element from a beam. We knocked off at 5 PM, set up N0KTY's canopy, and watched college football and ate the rest of the evening. Even though Van KC4WSK could not be there, the highlight of the evening turned out to be food - the main course - a mystery bag of something that W2DZO grabbed out of his freezer that turned out to be some great chili.

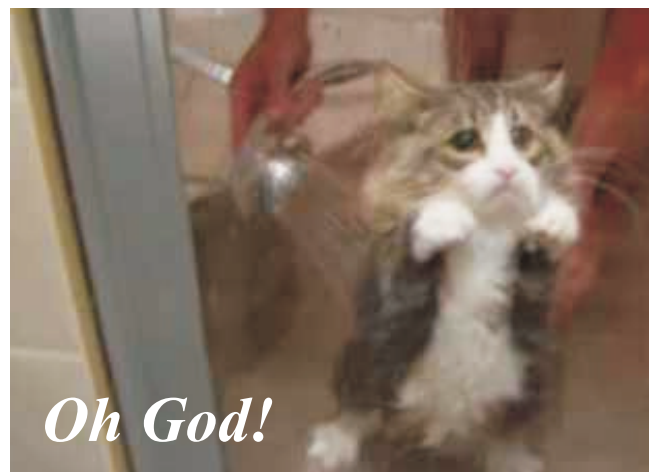
www.facebook.com: Facebook gives people the power to share and makes the world more open and connected.
